A BOOKATHON LIFE: A TRIBUTE TO JIM GERARD A Special Interview by Sheila Grattan

Jim Gerard, the late Friends of the Palm Springs Library board member and book sale volunteer, could no more stay away from books than a fish could survive without water. He is pictured at left with Chris Seidel, President of Friends of the Palm Springs Library.

With a twinkle in his eye and a demeanor a tad over the top, Mr. Gerard had none of the characteristics of a "book worm" and all the bravado and delightful drama of a gentleman who

knows his way around back stage at the Old Vic, the Paris Opera House and the Met.

Mr. Gerard lived a "bookathon" life, first as a worldwide book publisher for a branch of the United Nations and later, as the Palm Springs retiree who wore his old clothes to sort and price thousands of books for the annual Friends sale before scooting home to host friends for spirited conversation at his exquisite Deepwell sanctuary.

Living in Manhattan for decades before moving to Palm Springs, Mr. Gerard's life itself reads like a book. Eleanor Roosevelt befriended Gerard when was a young college grad and had just first moved to New York from Chicago. The former first lady hosted regular salon-like luncheons, introducing Gerard to such quintessential Manhattan luminaries as Sen. Jacob K. Javits, who represented New York in the U.S. Senate from 1957 to 1981, and Leonard Bernstein, acclaimed composer/ conductor and Lifetime Laureate of the New York Philharmonic until his death in 1990. Another good friend was skater and film star Sonja Henie.

Mr. Gerard's secret to attracting such accomplished and varied friends was his ability to never put anyone to sleep, especially those who were famous enough to be the target of professional bores.

"Eleanor and I remained close friends throughout her life. She was one of the most gracious people I have ever known and a wonderful conversationalist," recalled Mr. Gerard, who mainly discussed current events and politics with FDR's widow.

Mr. Gerard's career was not without controversy. in retrospect, he relished the drama with delight. UNESCO became controversial during the communist witch hunts of the 1950s. The mere memory caused Mr. Gerard to toss his head back and laugh. Sen. Joseph McCarthy believed UNESCO was a publisher of Communist propaganda back in the 1950s during the time the senator conducted his famous House Un-American Activities (HUAC) hearings.

Fortunately for Mr. Gerard, the investigation evaporated when congressional leaders realized UNESCO books were basically "how to books for the world," helping poor farmers and families of under-developed countries improve agriculture and health while preserving languages and other cultural heritage. Mr. Gerard's most popular UNESCO publications were a series called Study *Abroad*. These were sourcebooks for hundreds of scholarships around the world. There also was a sourcebook for science teaching with experiments that used common substances found in the home.

"Hardly controversial," Mr. Gerard chortled.

Mr. Gerard, the vibrant, widely-read storyteller sorting donated books into the 21 categories offered in the sale was on a mission to make others fall in love with books when last interviewed. He was a stickler for a book's condition. "Every hardback has its original cover and many look as if they have never been opened," he proudly said in 2009. "You can't find a better deal than \$2 - what we charge for every hardcover. Soft covers are \$1 and paperbacks 50 cents."

Palm Springs Friends of the Library could not find a better friend, board member and volunteer than Jim Gerard who died in February. Even when failing in the hospital, his mission was all about books and having more new readers succumb to lifelong book affairs. "One of the last things Jim did was to suggest the Friends purchase new books in Spanish from a bookseller going out of business in downtown Palm Springs," said Chris Seidel, president, Friends of the Palm Springs Library. "It was a wonderful idea. The board did buy the books and we donated them to the City's Main Library at Sunrise Park.

Jim Gerard, the international publisher, now has another book legacy going forward, fittingly, in both Spanish and English."

and wedding, the pair set sail for Paris, where they become the golden couple in a lively and volatile group, the fabled "Lost Generation" that includes Gertrude Stein, Ezra Pound, and F. Scott Fitzgerald."

The book is available for regular checkout in the Library, thanks to the Friends of the Palm Springs Library.

Book Club meetings are on the third Friday of the month at 2:00 p.m. in the Library Reading Center. there is no cost to attend and everyone is welcome.

Every March, readers nominate books for the following year, the top ten of which are selected by vote.

Next year's books will be published soon.


