Library patrons three years ago. They return with new tales of this famous road.

In December, the Friends were overwhelmed with gratitude at receiving a donation of \$200,000 from the Eileen

and Robert Pollock Family Trust. This gift comes at an opportune time as we embark on a very large project: to improve the appearance of the Children's Room, the furniture of which -- if you have visited recently – is in notably dilapidated condition. But thanks to the Pollock's gift, new furniture is being ordered!



Eileen and Bob Pollock were loyal library users for many years. They especially liked the Library's selection of classic movies on DVD, for the couple had achieved fame and wealth together, writing screenplays for many top television shows. Their most famous work was on the long-running 1980s TV series, *Dynasty*, but they also brought the daytime series, *The Doctors*, its highest ratings in the early 1970s. The pair also wrote for *General Hospital* from 1976 to 1977. In 1997, a Golden Palm Star was dedicated to them on the Palm Springs' "Walk of Stars." After retiring to Palm Springs, Bob and Eileen were generous philanthropists, donating to many desert charities. In fact, the Pollock Theatre at College of the Desert is named in their honor.

Eileen passed away in 2012, six months after suffering a massive stroke. Robert died in Palm Springs four years later, at 99. His goal had been to reach 100, but he succumbed just two days shy of that milestone! We will miss them, but they will live on through their generosity to our community. We were also very gratified to receive another grant from US Bank, which will be used to pay for performers, craft supplies, and handouts for our children's programs.

These grants and large donations are valuable to our stability as a non-profit. However, it is you, our members, who help us thrive. Because of your memberships and volunteering we are able to support our Library. Thank you!

Is It Summer Yet?


Happy New Year! Can you believe it is 2017? Believe it or not, Library Staff has already been in full development phase for Summer Reading Program 2017. Over the past few months, we have been scheduling performers, ordering prizes, and planning the logistics of the entire program. We will be overhauling a major

feature of this year's Program. Instead of giving away small toys and trinkets when children check in each week, we are going to give each child a free book instead. I had this inspiration when I attended the recent California Library Association Annual Conference.

Librarians mentioned giving children a free book when they registered for Summer Reading, rather than making the child reach a certain goal to get a free book. Many children, however, did not reach the goal, and did not receive a book. When I got back to my Library and started brainstorming with staff, we wondered, "Why are we just giving away one free book? Why don't we give books every week instead of toys?" We are excited to put a free book, each week, into the hands of every child or teen participating in Summer Reading.

Adults were also asking for weekly trinkets, so we decided to revamp the adult Summer Reading Program to include weekly check-ins. Adults will be given a coupon each week for a free book from our Friends used book sale shelves. Adults are going to get free books too!

One of the major goals of the Friends of the Palm Springs Library, and the Library itself is to encourage literacy. At the most recent Friends of the Library Board meeting, the Board was so excited about this project that they unanimously agreed to pay for all the books as well as keep the used book sale shelves well-stocked for the adults during the Summer Reading Program.



We may have some sad kids who loved the toys, but we believe free books will be a lasting gift that will be remembered for a lifetime. The trinkets we gave away in the past probably ended up in the garbage within a few weeks. We are helping children build, or begin their personal libraries, improve reading skills, and encourage the concept of giving.

Monday, February 20th. Lecture & Reception: William F. Cody, the Architect. William F. Cody made his mark creating elegant, timeless buildings that are considered masterpieces of "Desert Modern" architecture, and this installation from Laura Sorvetti, Special Collections & Archives Librarian at the Robert E. Kennedy Library, California Polytechnic State University/San Luis Obispo –will greatly expand your knowledge of the Cody archive. Not only will we see a special videotaped interview with his daughter, Catherine Cody Nemirovsky, but she will attend and be able to add her comments on the memories and insights only a daughter could know. Local architecture expert, Michael Stern will moderate.

The 2-hour event will begin at 2:00 PM in the main Library atrium, followed by an hour-long reception of wine and light hors d'oeuvres in *our* Cody-designed Library, catered by Jennifer's Kitchen. This special event requires advanced ticket purchase online at www.modernismweek.com for \$55.

Tuesday, February 21st. Modernism Lecture: Union Bank **Art Panels.** Learn about the fascinating history and origin of the bas-relief sculpture in terra cotta at Union Bank, "Palm Springs in Sculpture - Past & Future," created by sculptor Lawrence Tenney Stevens (1896-1972). The bank was dedicated on September 18, 1959, when the south branch of the First Security National Bank opened. It is now Union Bank at 500 S. Indian Canyon Dr. The lecturer is David L. Gray, long-time Friends member, former Palm Springs Public Library Trustee (2009-2016), and recipient of the 2014 Outstanding Community Service Leader Award from the Desert Business Association. He has a B.S. degree in Art History & English from Atlantic Union College, and has lived in Palm Springs since 2003. This event will be presented at the Welwood Murray Memorial Library in lecture format at 10:30-12:00 & 1:30-3:00 and requires advanced ticket purchase for \$20.

February 17 – 26. Modernism Exhibit – Fast Forward: The Architecture of William F. Cody. This special exhibit arrives in Palm Springs directly from the Los Angles Architecture +

Design Museum in a self-guided exhibit celebrating the centennial of architect William F. Cody and his seminal contributions to Modern architecture. See images, photos, plans and more spanning his career; many never previously seen. Also on display will be new projects created by architecture students after studying Cody's archive housed at Cal Poly/San Luis Obispo. A video with curator Jo Lauria will be screened, as interviewed by local architecture expert Michael Stern, wherein she describes the exhibit and its relevance today. This one-of-a-kind exhibition of Cody's architecture is based on archival research and additional input from his family. Cody's important legacy and influence continues to serve as inspiration for successive generations of designers, and the objects on display, created by architecture students of Cal Poly/San Luis Obispo, are a testament to Cody's relevance in the ongoing dialogue about architecture. The exhibit will be open daily Feb. 17 – 26 from 10 AM – 4 PM and requires advanced ticket purchase (\$10 online at www.modernismweek.com or at the door for \$15.

EVER WONDER HOW THE FRIENDS' GROUP ORIGINATED?

The Friends organization was created by Marge Crommelin, a long time Palm Springs resident of Palm Springs. She and her husband Jacques were active members in the community. Marge joined the Library Board of Trustees in October 1969, replacing Melba Bennett, one of the original members. In 1971, she was appointed to chair a committee to establish a Friends' group, which would include one librarian from each of the three PS libraries to serve with her. She recommended that the organizational group be comprised of ten local residents, equally divided between men and women.

Jacques was a prominent local real estate appraiser and active realtor. After Jacques died, Marge became the sole trustee of their estate, so their large donation of \$500,000 to the Friends is in her name, though the bequests made in her

MY FIRST BOOK BY CATHY BRANT

At a recent board meeting we were discussing how to make the newsletter more interesting and interactive. The idea came up about when and how we had bought our first book with our own money. I asked everyone if they would send me their stories. Here's what Director of Library Services Jeannie Kays wrote:

As far as my first book that I bought with my own money, I'm not sure. My mom took me to the library a lot and I ordered books through the Scholastic book orders in my classroom all the time. I also used to buy books at garage sales for a quarter.

The first book I remember owning and reading all by myself was "Little Red Hen" by Paul Galdone. I was so proud that I could read a book on my own. "Not I!" said the dog. "Not I!" said the cat. "Not I!" said the rat. "Then I will!" said the Little Red Hen. I still have the book.

My own experience happened much later, as I grew up borrowing books from the library now known as the Welwood Memorial Library. In high school, my favorite teacher was Irving Sussman, who taught English. We went on a field trip one day and had a chance to visit a bookstore. I saw his book, How to Read a Dirty Book, Or the Way of the Pilgrim Reader, which cost \$3.95. Buying it made me feel very growup! I still have it.
