Gifts to the Library were greatly increased in 2018 by a generous, estate-planned donation from the Robert and Elaine Pollock Family Trust and we are ever so grateful to the Pollock family.

Recently we provided funding to purchase additional Adult Fiction and non-Fiction books, eBooks, audio books, children's books and DVDs. In addition, we plan to provide funds for the Career Online Program, which will provide scholarships for individuals working toward their GED. Nothing makes us happier than supporting our Library's community!

Additionally, mark your calendars for our members-only Annual Meeting this year, which will take place on Sunday, March 25 at the former home of Gloria Swanson, which is now called The Amin Casa. Happy New Year! What's New at the Library?

Happy New Year! New Year, New You! Resolve to improve yourself! These are catchphrases that are often heard this



time of year. You don't hear "Just keep doing the same old thing." Or "Nothing ever changes." We at the Library believe that each year is an opportunity to improve and provide you with items and services that are beneficial to you and help YOU improve your life. We are not sitting here waiting

for things to change; we are making changes every day.

For example, our City Council approved the purchase of 26 new all-in-one computers to replace our five-year-old public computers, which were used over 57,000 times in the last year alone, so it is time for new ones! Computer technology changes so quickly that these new computers will run faster and, most importantly, have larger screens for users to see their work more easily.

Our next project is to purchase new, comfortable seating throughout the library to replace our worn furniture—to be paid by City General Funds and Library Trust Funds. As far as online resources, we plan to use The Friends of the Library funds to supplement our eBook collection (we have over 6,600 eBooks, by the way) as well as start a Career Online High School diploma program. Stay tuned for more details in the coming months.

Did you know? There were 223, 218 visits to the library last year, 2016-17. We checked out 431,283 physical items and 13, 527 eBooks. We hosted 310 programs which 8,799 people attended. Thank you for your support!

MODERNISM WEEK EVENTS

If you haven't yet purchased your tickets for The Friends' Modernism Week events, there are still some available! Please join us for one or both events on February 22. The morning features a self-guided tour of the Dr. Hugh Stephens House, an early example of the collaboration between Albert Frey and John Porter Clark. The residence features many elements of mid-century design including walls of glass, a low-pitched, combination flat-and-shed roof, concrete masonry walls and a striking copper fireplace hood. The house plan also includes one of the first family rooms (as chronicled in a 1955 House Beautiful article). The event will also include a brief poolside talk about the history of the house and a self-guided tour of the home's interior. Each tour-goer will receive a copy of the popular 74-page PSPF publication Architecture 100, which includes an entry on the Stephens Residence.

There are four tours beginning at 10 AM.


The afternoon event is a lecture in the Learning Center at our Library by the very entertaining architectural historian and critic, Alan Hess. He will present a richly illustrated dis-



cussion as he explores themes relevant to how the architectural environment of our community evolved and how these forces continue to influence what gets constructed today. Mr. Hess will take us through several examples of projects, both well- and lesser-known, to illuminate the ways in which the sometimes harsh, sometimes benign, desert climate spurred de-

sign solutions and how those solutions influenced our social fabric. This lecture will provide insightful commentary, sure to inform and entertain.

Mr. Hess is a nationally recognized architect, author, historian and critic whose 19 books have included Palm Springs Weekend: The Architecture and Design of a Mid-Century Oasis and Frank Lloyd Wright: Natural Design, Organic Architecture. He has been responsible for qualifying several landmark buildings for the National Register of Historic Places, including the oldest operating McDonalds and the Hotel Valley Ho in



Scottsdale. He writes a very informative architectural blog in addition to being the Architecture Critic for the San Jose Mercury News.

The lecture begins at 2 PM.

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ANNUAL MEETING

Please join us for The Friends' Annual Meeting on March 25, from 2 to 4 at Amin Casa, the historic Gloria Swanson house

in the Tennis Club neighborhood of Palm Springs. The event will feature drinks and snacks followed by a short business meeting, which includes an update on Library activities by City Librarian Jeannie Kays.

Our featured speaker will be film historian Gary Smith, who will give a short talk on the work and legacy of Gloria Swanson. He is the



author of seven books dealing with various aspects of motion picture history. These cover such eclectic subjects as epic films, British horror movies, vampire films, American International Pictures, and a detailed study of the movie Forever Amber. Mr. Smith has also appeared in several documentaries including The Gigantic World of Epics for Turner Movie Classics, It Was a Colossal Teenage Movie Machine: The American International Story, Claudette Colbert: Queen of the Silver Screen, and Cecil B. DeMille: Hollywood's Epic Director. He is presently working on a book about best-selling novels made into films.

The event is free to all members of the Friends. If you would like to bring guests, the fee is \$20, which includes a one-year membership to the Friends. As a Friends member, you will receive an email blast once our Annual Meeting event has been posted on the website (www.friendsofthepalmspringslibrary.org), under "Events." At that time you will have the opportunity to register yourself as "attending," thus securing yourself a spot, as seating is limited.

OP-ED: YOUR VOICE

We all know our Library is a vital community resource. But do you

know how vital? Check these statistics, based on fical year 2016-2017:

- Library visits: 223,000
- Materials checked out: 431,000Number of programs: 310
- Attendance at Library programs: 8,800

These numbers belie the commonly-held belief that our Library is no longer a relevant service to our community and thus should face decreasing funding from the City. In fact, our Library and its staff are doing a lot more with a lot less. Keep these numbers in mind: while circulation over the last 10 years has increased 22%, funding has actually DECREASED 8%. Correspondingly, staffing levels have fallen from 23 to 13.

It is time for our voices to be heard in the City dialogue. If you believe in our Library and its contribution to our community, let your elected representatives know of its importance! And ask them to fund it appropriately!

Wednesday, February 7th Film Screening: *Between Allah & Me (and Everyone Else)*. This film unveils the intricate and complex effects of hijab on Muslim women, their families and the communities in which they live. Wednesday, February 21st Modernism Week Special Film Screenng: *Journeyman Architect: the Life and Work of Donald Wexler.* This film explores the groundbreaking work of this renowned local architect who is garnering new appreciation worldwide and is providing inspiration for a new generation of architects. His novel also won Honorable Mention at The New England Book Festival.

Wednesday, March 14th Author Lecture: Carol Mann & Lynn Centeno: "All the Ways A Woman." The book is a celebration of women as seen through the eyes of watercolorist Lynn Centeno and the pen of author/poet Carol Mann. This collection of original poetry and art – celebrating and honoring women – depicts a woman's journey through life: her thoughts, her loves, her many roles, her dreams and desires. Each poem is paired with a watercolor to capture a special moment within that journey.

Wednesday, March 21st Author Lecture: Wade Rouse will be discussing his third book, *The Recipe Box*, under the pen name Viola Shipman (in homage to his grandmother). This story tells the tale about a lost young woman and the family recipe box that changes her life.
